Tobacco Numbers

Last week I discussed the decline in the number of pounds Burley Tobacco being grown in the US and in Ohio over the past few years. The numbers are pretty staggering if you go back to the 1990s.

When you look at these numbers, and consider just for Ohio, these are millions of pounds. Tobacco has been in the in the range of \$1.75 to \$2.00 per pound for most of this time for many producers, depending on crop quality. Put those numbers together and it shows impact for Ohio. Consider that Adams and Brown Counties made up nearly two thirds of the tobacco produced in Ohio and it makes it an even bigger impact for this area. From 1997 to 2015 in the numbers above you are looking at nearly 35 million less pounds in Ohio, so nearly 24 million less pounds for Adams and Brown Counties over that span of less than 20 years. Forty plus million dollars less in this area, that is huge.

With foreign trade being in the news, last year I believe the number I saw was 122 million pounds of burley imported into the United States.
