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The End: Winter or Hay Supply?

So, which will end first, this dreadful winter or your shrinking hay supply? I have talked to several livestock producers that wonder that on a daily basis. When you listen to the 5 or 7-day forecast it seems to always have more days with either rain or snow forecasted than sun.

The recent weather conditions have continued to result in more than normal consumption of hay by cattle. Typically, livestock will consume more high quality hay than they can poor quality. Most often the reason for this it that the poor quality hay is poor because it was harvested late and was over mature. If this is the case it contains more fiber. The more fiber the more bulk and results in the stomach being full.

If cows are full they are normally ok, or so they seem. They appear full, they are not bawling, so they must be happy. Happy and ok are not the same in this case.

If the hay is high in fiber and low in nutrients it may not be meeting the nutritional needs of the animals. So even though they are "happy" they may be malnourished. When you take malnourished and add the stress of mud and then some cold wet weather it pulls pretty hard on cattle. This is even more true for older cows. Older cows is a broad term so cows over 10 may be on the edge, older than 12 would be leaning over the edge and if you have older than that they are a high risk not making it through a winter like this.

In the past we have talked increasing feed, and recently I have discussed the need for a good mineral program. With the current state we are in, coming off of months of stressful conditions and poor quality hay that really goes back to our stockpiled grasses in the fall, the need for additional feed is even more needed. In the past an additional 2 or 3 pounds was a big help for cattle. At this point that may not be enough. Probably 5 or 6 pounds of a high energy feed for the next 45 days or so would be well worth the cost of the feed.
